Writing Thesis Statements Part II





The Steps:

Remember the steps to writing an effective thesis statement.

1.Find a topic. 2.Identify or write your question. **3.Answer the question in** one strong sentence. 4.Gather your support.

Choose a Topic

For this task, I want you to think of a specific person. Here are the requirements:

- 1. The person must have once been a REAL flesh-and-bone human (like you and me).
- 2. The person is no longer alive.
- 3. The person IMPROVED this world in a positive way.
- 4. You admire this person.



You know this person's first and last name (if they used both names publicly).

Write a Question

Your task is to eventually write a research paper (not really, but let's pretend ⁽ⁱ⁾) about your topic. Write an appropriate question.

TIPS:

- 1. Notice that so far there is not a question. Wait....actually, THERE IS a question. It is implied! What is the implied question here?
- 2. Hint: During the instructions, you were told to think of someone who had made a positive contribution to the world. How can you turn this situation into a question? I know you can do it!
- 3. What types of things will you mention in the paper? What QUESTION will the paper answer?

You've got it! Write down the implied question. Page 4

Write a Thesis Statement

- 1. Your thesis statement is a one-sentence answer to the question.
- 2. The thesis statement has two parts.
- 3. The first part of the thesis is to mention the topic. (Make sure you mention the person's name.)
- 4. The second part of the thesis statement is to take a position or make a claim about the topic. What is your position?

What is wrong with the following thesis statements?

- 1. Who made the best invention of all time?
- 2. This essay is going to be about Thomas Jefferson.
- 3. Without my special person, you wouldn't be able to listen to music today!
- 4. Swish! Did you hear that? It was the sound of a basket in a game of basketball, which was invented by James Naismith.

Don't forget to jot down the major groups of evidence that you'll use in the paper.

Hello, class! Today you are going to write an expository essay about a book or famous poem that changed your life. You must choose an event that ended before 1975, since that's all we've studied.

This paper must be a multiple-paragraph essay, and you will have 50 minutes to write it. You may begin.

Hello, class! We have finally finished preparing for the big test, so now we'll write an essay. That's right; we're writing an essay! This paper must be a multiple-paragraph essay, and you will have 50 minutes to write it. You may begin.
